Although the weather was cold and bleak, the Kilkare Lodge at the final Dinner Series Event of 2021 was warm and inviting. Guests arrived to a candlelit dining room and were greeted with a drink to kick off the evening. This past month's collaborator, Dan Oskey, stood front and center as he prepared the other cocktail pairings for the remainder of the evening.

Dan Oskey is the Founder and Chief Operator of Tattersall Distilling Company. Founded in 2014, Tattersall is one of the most highly acclaimed and fastest growing craft distilleries in the country. With a focus on using the best ingredients available, sourced locally whenever possible, Tattersall makes more than 30 all-natural, award-winning spirits, liqueurs, and ready-to-drink cocktails. After spending the last 6 years in NE Minneapolis, Tattersall

recently opened a new distillery in River Falls, Wisconsin. The company expanded and moved into a new territory due to Minnesota's restrictive liquor laws. MN is the only state in the country that still has 3.2% ABV beer and that limits what large craft brewers can and cannot sell. Distilleries, like Tattersall, can't sell full-sized bottles and once the operation gets "too big", they can't operate a cocktail room. With all these restrictions working against Tattersall's expanding business, they were essentially forced to move out of state. Their new location is home to a full-service restaurant and cocktail bar, an outdoor patio with fire pits and lawn games, a large amphitheater for concerts and weddings, an expansive ballroom for up to 420 people, and a retail space. There they will have no limits on their production capacity.

NIGHTSHADES: AVOIDING THE LET-DOWNS

We all enjoy our meat and potatoes, and our pasta and marinara. But did you know that these aren't the best foods to be consuming, especially in the winter? When the daylight hours are shortened and our energy levels have dipped down, it's best to eat a variety of different vegetables. Certain Nightshade foods to avoid are:

- Eggplants
- Potatoes (except sweet potatoes)

- Tomatoes
- Peppers (red, green, yellow, chili)
- Red spices
- Hot sauces

Good substitutes for these include sweet potatoes, mushrooms, carrots, celery, and cauliflower. Avoid refined breads, pastas and grains. Tomatoes are the only fruits used in cooking that is a nightshade, and has low dietary benefits as well. Eat well, eat healthy!

WORD FROM A&E

Happy New Year from the A & E committee! I hope all of you are enjoying this new year already and had a wonderful holiday! As a committee, we would like to spend the next few months picking a topic relevant to the committee and try to answer some of our most frequently asked questions and clearing up confusions with understanding the covenants.

This month, we're talking about combining lots. In the 2020

Restated Declaration of Covenants Article V; section 9: "Whenever two or more contiguous lots are owned by the same owner, and the owner desires to use two or more lots as a consolidated site for a single-family residence or a consolidated site in the Perpetual Camping Area, he/she shall first apply to the AECC for approval according to the policies and procedures to combine lots established by the AECC. If approval for a consolidated site is granted by the AECC, and a single-family residence is constructed on the consolidated site or a consolidated site for camping is approved, then an approved,

septic system shall be installed on the consolidated site, and the consolidated site shall be treated in all respects as a single lot for the purpose of applying this 2020 Restated Declaration including, but not limited to, Section 1 of Article VII which governs assessments. The consolidated site shall be considered a single lot for assessments".

A maximum of four (4) contiguous lots may be combined, except fewer lots will be allowed where the combined acreage does not exceed six (6) acres.


